Introduced

<u>House Bill 281 (Damage Collection Requirements)</u> sponsored by Reps. Seitz a (R – Cincinnati) and Young (R – Dayton) amends R.C. 2307.60 to require in a civil action for damages caused by another person's criminal act that such other person was convicted of, pleaded guilty to, or adjudicated delinquent in connection with the criminal act.

<u>House Bill 289 (SORN Law Noncompliance)</u> sponsored by Reps. Robb Blasdel (R – Columbiana) and Swearingen (R – Huron) provides that if a Tier I or Tier II sex offender/child-victim offender fails to comply with duties under the SORN law, the period of time that the offender has a duty to comply is tolled during the time of the failure, and to make disseminating matter harmful to juveniles a sexually oriented offense and a person who violates the offense a Tier I sex offender/child-victim offender.

<u>House Bill 295 (Age Verification – Material Harmful to Juveniles)</u> sponsored by Rep. Demetriou (R – Chagrin Falls) prohibits an organization from failing to verify the age of a person attempting to access material that is obscene or harmful to juveniles, to prohibit a person from using another person's likeness to create sexual images of the other person, and to create a private right of action for each prohibited activity.

<u>Senate Bill 165 (Catalytic Converters)</u> sponsored by Sen. Johnson (R – McDermott) establishes more stringent regulations surrounding the sale of used catalytic converters and increases penalties for theft of catalytic converters and receiving stolen catalytic converters.

Reported Out of Committee

<u>House Bill 56 (Fleeing/Stunt Driving)</u> sponsored by Reps. Plummer (R – Dayton) and White (R – Kettering) increases the penalties for certain fleeing offenses, amends the street racing statute to also prohibit stunt driving, and requires the adoption of written pursuit policies by law enforcement. <u>House Bill 111 (Domestic Violence Penalties)</u> sponsored by Reps. LaRe and Kevin Miller increases the penalty for felony domestic violence to a high tier F3 and establishes a presumption in favor of prison.

House Bill 161 (Sexual Assault – Spousal Exceptions) sponsored by Reps. Miranda and Hillyer eliminates the spousal exception for various sexual assault offenses.
