### Prosecutors -

I want to use my space this quarter to talk about two developments that OPAA has worked on with the goal of generating more interest among young lawyers and soon to be lawyers in becoming prosecutors.

The first is the Rural Practice Incentive Program created in House Bill 150 (134th General Assembly). This is a loan repayment program law students who are in their final year of law school and for attorneys who have been licensed for eight years or less and who agree to serve in some specified legal roles in Ohio counties where there are fewer lawyers. One of the roles that is eligible under this program is assistant prosecutor. Applicants must commit to a minimum term of service of at least 3 years and may request to serve 4 or 5 years. Loan repayment is up to \$10,000 per year. More counties are eligible for this program than you might think. To learn more, visit highered.ohio.gov/rural-practice. The application period is open through March 15. I am proud that OPAA was able to get assistant prosecutors included in this program and hope that at least some of your offices can benefit from it.

The second is a change to Rule II of the Rules for the Government of the Bar that expands eligibility for limited practice of law by a legal intern. The change to the rule allows 2Ls and recent law school graduates to obtain their legal intern certificate. Previously, the rule only allowed 3Ls who were still enrolled in law school to obtain the certificate. Recent graduates must have graduated from an ABA approved law school, have applied to take the first Ohio bar following their graduation (or have taken it and be awaiting the results), and agree to be bound by the Rules II and IV of the Rules for the Government of the Bar as well as the Ohio Rules of Professional Conduct. These intern certificates can be very attractive to law students who want to get into the courtroom. Prosecutors who are willing to support that will convince more soon to be lawyers of the good that prosecutors do and attract more people to the profession.

### Legislative Top 10 Bills to Watch

- 1) House Bill 51 (Second Amendment Preservation Act). Prohibits a public office, public officer, or employee of the state or a political subdivision from enforcing federal law regarding firearms. Subjects the state or political subdivision to liability through a private cause of action for enforcing, attempting to enforce, or participating in any way in the enforcement of federal acts, executive orders, administrative orders, rules, regulations, statutes, or ordinances regarding firearms and for employing any former federal employees who worked on such issues while in federal employment. *OPAA Position Opposed.*
- 2) House Bill 86/House Bill 354 (Adult Use Marijuana Implementation). Both bills make changes to the language of Issue 2 and the Adult-Use Marijuana program. House Bill 86 was amended by the Senate in December 2023 to make substantial changes to Issue 2 including provisions on home grow, THC limits, use, possession, and transportation, smoking in a vehicle, and the social equity and jobs program. House Bill 354 in the House's vision of Issue 2 implementation. It makes much more limited changes to Issue 2 that include minor tweaks to use, possession, and transportation. *OPAA Position Under Review/ Amend.*

- 3) Senate Bill 101/House Bill 259 (Death Penalty Repeal). Repeals the death penalty. *OPAA Position Opposed*.
- 4) House Bill 111 (Domestic Violence Penalties). Makes felony domestic violence a "high-tier" F3 subject to a sentencing range of 1 to 5 years rather than 9 to 36 months. *OPAA Position Support.*
- 5) House Bill 230 (Drug Trafficking/Organized Trafficking of Person). Increases penalties for trafficking cocaine, heroin, fentanyl, and methamphetamine. Creates a 5-year sentencing specification for involuntary manslaughter related to a fentanyl overdose death. Removes provisions from the drug possession law related to Schedule III, IV, and V drugs mixed with fentanyl. Creates the offense of offense of organized trafficking in persons. OPAA Position Support.
- 6) House Bill 196 (Community Control Sanctions). Makes changes to the maximum period of community control for misdemeanors, F5 and F4 offenses (2 years) and F3 offenses (3 years). Specifies that for a "technical violation of community control, the court may impose a more restrictive non-residential sanction or impose a "temporary incarceration sanction" that for a first technical violation shall not be more than 15 days, for a second technical violation shall not be more than 30 days, for a third technical violation shall not be more than 45 days for a fourth or subsequent technical violation may include any sanction authorized in 2929.15(B)(1)(a) to (c). Finally, the bill amends the definition of technical violation to apply to all felonies rather than only F5s and non-violent/non-sex offense F4s. *OPAA Position Opposed.*
- 7) Senate Bill 26 (OVI Law Marijuana). Changes the law regarding per se OVI for marijuana. The bill requires at least five nanograms of Delta-9 THC per milliliter of the person's blood for per se OVI. It creates an inference that the person is under the influence of marijuana if they have at least twenty-five nanograms of Delta-9 THC per milliliter of urine or at least two, but less than five, nanograms of Delta-9 THC per milliliter of blood. *OPAA Position Opposed.*
- 8) House Bill 91/Senate Bill 100 (Tracking Devices). Prohibit a person from using a tracking device or application to track the position or movement of another person without the other person's consent. A violation is a misdemeanor of the first degree for a first offense. The penalty is enhanced to a felony of the fourth degree for any subsequent violation and under other specified circumstances similar to those in the menacing by stalking statute. OPAA Position Support.
- 9) Senate Bill 127/House Bill 161 (Eliminate Spousal Exception for Sexual Assaults). Eliminates the spousal exceptions for the offenses of rape, sexual battery, unlawful sexual conduct with a minor, gross sexual imposition, and importuning and permits a person to testify against the person's spouse in a prosecution for one of these offenses. *OPAA Position Monitor*.

10) House Bill 385/Senate Bill 214 (Human Trafficking Victim Record Expungement). Allows victims of human trafficking to expunge records of misdemeanors, F5, and F4 offenses without requiring that they have a prior conviction for soliciting, loitering to engage in solicitation, or prostitution as required by current. Victims who apply for expungement under the bill will have to demonstrate by clear and convincing evidence, rather than a preponderance, that the offense was the result of the applicant being a victim of human trafficking. *OPAA Position – Under review.*

circumstances under the SORN Law in effect prior to that date; to subsequently amend section 2305.111 of the Revised Code five years after the effective date of that section to remove the described elimination of the limitations period; and to declare an emergency.

### New and Noteworthy



### Merit Decisions of Interest Since 11/1/23

State v. Johnson, \_\_\_ Ohio St.3d \_\_\_, 2024-Ohio-134. The Court (4-3) concluded that the untimely/successive petitioner's evidentiary documentation was insufficient to show that the defense was unavoidably prevented from timely learning of the witness' purported recantation, and, regardless, a claim of witness perjury is insufficient to demonstrate a constitutional violation unless the prosecution knowingly used the perjured testimony. (Decided 1-18-24; Cuyahoga County)

State v. Randolph, \_\_\_\_ Ohio St.3d \_\_\_\_, 2023-Ohio-4753. The Court (7-0) held that, generally speaking, a tenant has the authority to invite guests to the tenant's apartment and to allow the guest to have ingress and egress via common areas to and from that apartment despite any action by the landlord to ban the guest, unless there is a specific provision to the contrary in the rental agreement giving the landlord the authority to ban particular persons regardless of any such invitation. (Decided 12-29-23; City of Toledo appeal)

State v. Mills, \_\_\_ Ohio St.3d \_\_\_, 2023-Ohio-4716. In a split decision (3-1-1-2), four justices agreed that the failure to hold a competency hearing was harmless because a review of the entire record indicated a lack of sufficient indicia of incompetence. (Decided 12-28-23; Lucas County)

State v. Swazey, \_\_\_\_ Ohio St.3d \_\_\_\_, 2023-Ohio-4627. The Court (4-3) concluded that the trial court should have ruled on the merits of the defendant's pretrial motion to dismiss raising constitutional and statutory grounds challenging whether the defendant could be prosecuted at all for criminal nonsupport in light of State v. Pittman, 150 Ohio St.3d 113, 2016-Ohio-8314. By the same majority, the Court held that the defendant's guilty pleas did not waive or forfeit these legal challenges. (Decided

12-22-23; State's appeal; Medina County)

*In re E.S.*, \_\_\_ Ohio St.3d \_\_\_, 2023-Ohio-4273. The Court (7-0) reaffirmed the standard to be applied by the juvenile court in determining whether there is probable cause to bind the juvenile over to adult court, as set forth in *State v. Martin*, 170 Ohio St.3d 181, 2022-Ohio-4175. The Court overturned the juvenile court's conclusion that the State had failed to establish probable cause as to the offense of involuntary manslaughter. (Decided 12-1-23; State's appeal; Cuyahoga County)

State v. Daniel, \_\_\_ Ohio St.3d \_\_\_, 2023-Ohio-4035. The Court (4-3) rejected a separation-of-powers challenge to R.C. 2909.15(D)(2)(b), which allows the sentencing court to reduce the duration of the arson offender's lifetime registration duty only upon the recommendation of the prosecutor and law enforcement agency. (Decided 11-9-23; Lucas County)

**23-751 & -838** *State v. Myers* Whether a trial court's decision on a motion for appointment of experts in a capital postconviction proceeding is a provisional remedy pursuant to R.C. 2505.02(B)(4) and therefore a final order. (Warren County)

**23-1318 & -1417** *State v. Logan* Whether R.C. 2929.13(F)(8) requires a mandatory prison term and precludes the imposition of community-control sanctions on an underlying felony when a defendant is found guilty on a corresponding firearm specification. (State's appeals; Cuyahoga County)

23-1289 State v. Smith Whether the domestic violence victim's statements were non-testimonial for Confrontation Clause purposes because they fell within the "ongoing emergency" doctrine when they were made to police in an ambulance while she was being treated for injuries, even though the suspect was not nearby and the victim was now some distance away from the scene of the attack. (State's appeal; Cuyahoga County)

**23-1299** *State v. Kennedy* (1) Whether judicial-release eligibility is determined separately for each stated prison term; (2) Whether the sentencing court can grant judicial release only on the stated prison term imposed by that court. (State's appeal; Franklin County)

**23-1149** *State v. Riley* In a case involving an application for DNA testing, whether a trial court commits error when it immediately adopts the proposed judgment entry of one party without affording the other party a meaningful opportunity to be heard. (Cuyahoga County)

**23-772** *State v. Jones* Whether an appellate court abuses its discretion by denying leave to appeal the grant of a new trial in a 26-year-old capital case where the State complies with App.R.

Kyles* Whether causing serious physical harm to a stray cat qualifies as cruelty to animals under R.C. 959.131(C), which states that no person shall knowingly cause serious physical harm to a companion animal, and under R.C. § 959.131(A)(1), which defines "companion animal" as including "any dog or cat regardless of where it is kept". (State's appeal; Cuyahoga County)

Glover* (1) Whether trial and appellate courts applying R.C. 2929.14(C)(4) can give exclusive focus to the defendant's aggregate prison term when deciding whether consecutive sentencing is appropriate; (2) whether the court of appeals violated the clear-and-convincing standard of review under R.C. 2953.08(G)(2) by substituting its judgment for that of the sentencing court. (State's appeal; Hamilton County) (Argument on 2-7-24)

23-539 State v. Macklin (1) Whether the jurisdiction referenced in R.C. 2151.23(H) implicates jurisdiction over the case, not subject-matter jurisdiction; (2) Whether R.C. 2151.23(H) as interpreted in State v. If dogs under the age of eight weeks old are sold directly to the public, R.C. 955.50(A) does not apply. However, if dogs under the age of eight weeks old are sold for the purpose of being resold or placed into commerce, R.C. 955.50(A) does apply. Whether this statute applies to high volume dog breeders depends on to whom and for what purpose the dogs are sold. Finally, whether there is any payment made is irrelevant to the analysis because it is not in the statute.
